

Reading Corner



Be a reading family

Did you know that children read more when their parents are readers too? Consider these ways to get your family excited about reading together:

Collect frequent-reader "miles"

A trip around the world covers almost 25,000 miles. Let one book equal 2,500 miles, and have a family race to see who will be the first to read her/his way "around the world." You'll also be practicing your math skills as you tally up your miles!

Become a super-sleuth

Encourage your child to draw conclusions by reading short mysteries aloud. Try a book like *Five Minute Mini-Mysteries* (Stan Smith), or read online at *kids.mysterynet.com*. Before revealing the solution, let each person make a prediction and tell what clues tipped him or her off.

Reading Q & A

Read it again...and again?

Q: My son/daughter likes to read the same books over and over. How can I get him to try new ones?

A: Reading the same book repeatedly is actually good for your child. Each time he reads, he'll notice new things about it. For example, a word he didn't know the first time might become clear on the second reading. Or a part he might not have understood before may make sense when he rereads. Rereading is also the best way to practice fluency.

Music

Every time your students pick up their music textbooks or read the lyrics and music off the smart board, they are practicing important reading skills. For our youngest learners, they see that even in music, they must begin reading from left to right. Tracking is an important first literacy skill. Focused listening and speaking skills are a very important indicator of literacy. Your children are learning valuable listening skills and communication skills through speech and singing activities each music class.

Clothes to Kids

Clothes to Kids is a great resource in our area for kids who need school clothes. Located on the property of Lake Junaluska, it is a program that accepts gently used clothes.
