# 2014-2015 PRE-REQUISITE READING FOR HONORS ENGLISH III AMERICAN LITERATURE

DUE FIRST DAY OF ENGLISH CLASS

## PART ONE

The first part of the assignment requires you to read *Serena* by Ron Rash. For this novel you will complete a local color reading log. Requirements are listed below. You may use local libraries to borrow this title, or you can find the novel in bookstores in the area. Ordering from sites such as *amazon.com*, *booksense.com* and other online bookstores is a possibility. You must have a copy of the novel available for use the first week of class. You should be prepared to discuss, write an essay, or take a test this novel on the first day of class.

## **LOCAL COLOR READING LOG REQUIREMENTS**

You must complete 12 journal entries for Serena

Local Color - "style of writing derived from the presentation of the features and peculiarities of a particular locality and its inhabitants. It concerned itself mainly with depicting the character of a particular region, concentrating especially upon the peculiarities of dialect, manners, folklore, and landscape that distinguish the area."

- Why did you choose to read this novel?
- What information did you need to know before reading this novel?
- What has happened before the novel began?
- Who is telling the story?
- What is the setting and why is it important to the novel?
- What is the initial problem(s) faced by the main character?
- How does the author get your attention or hold your interest?
- Choose a quote and explain its significance to the novel.

# JOURNAL ENTRY 2 – MIDDLE $3^{rd}$ OF THE NOVEL - Please answer <u>all</u> of the following questions. Make sure your response is a minimum of 150 words.

## **GUIDING QUESTIONS:**

- What new things are added to the original problem as the novel progresses?
- What plot twists or unexpected events happen?
- What have you discovered about the author's style?
- Is there a message or a main theme emerging in the book?
- Describe at least two of the characters. Go beyond just the physical characteristics.
- Choose a quote and explain its significance to the novel.

JOURNAL ENTRY 3 – LAST  $3^{rd}$  OF THE NOVEL - Please answer <u>all</u> of the following questions. Make sure your response is a minimum of 150 words.

## **GUIDING QUESTIONS:**

- What is the climax of the novel?
- How are the major and minor conflicts resolved?
- What message did you get from the novel?
- How was this message conveyed?
- How realistic is the novel?
- How is the title important to the main idea of the novel?
- How does the novel compare to others that you have read?
- Why would you (or why wouldn't you) recommend this novel to a friend?
- Choose a quote and explain its significance to the novel.
