Driver's Ed. - What's Up?

In 1998 N.C. instated a law in effort to motivate and encourage students to complete high school. A student will need to have a Driving Eligibility Certificate in order to receive a N.C. driver's permit or license. A student must pass 5 out of 6 courses each semester (3 out of 4, if the school is on a 4 x 4 block) Students who do not meet this criteria will be reported to DMV & will have their driving privileges revoked.
