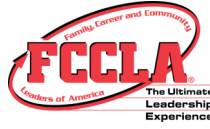
Mu Alpha Theta

To be eligible, students must like math. Students eligible for **Mu Alpha Theta Honor Society** must have completed Geometry with a combined non-weighted average of 3.0 and attend meetings regularly. Students wanting to participate on a Math Team must be willing to meet regularly for practices and be willing to help with the fund-raising activities. We participate in very prestigious competitions, including Furman Math Meet, Log 1 Math Contest, AMC 10/12 Competition, WCU State Math Competition, College of Charleston, Georgia Tech, and the Moody Mega Math Challenge, among others.
